## We Need Help

Transportation – driving the people we serve from home to school, work, doctor's appointments, you name it, is critical to our mission. Having reliable vehicles that get us back and forth are always necessary. That is why we are highlighting the need we have for replacing the driveway at Kahana House.

This makes it difficult to navigate, with the multitude of potholes, cracks, and gravel spots. Keeping our tires and suspension in good working condition is challenging. It also continues to erode at an increasing pace when we have any type of precipitation.

We need your help. The bids we received for the project were in the upper five figures, approaching nearly \$100,000 which is not something we take lightly. We are pursuing numerous avenues to fund this replacement and are looking for a company or individual who can help us with this at reduced cost.

#### **AHH - Model for Other Communities**

Artists Helping the Homeless (AHH) has over the years continually evaluated and refined its program and strategies. This involved assessing where we can be of the most use, what the greatest needs are, and where we can have the greatest success. That has brought us to our system of residences combined with a full set of services and a commitment to the individual as long as they are committed to the process.

This model has not only been highly successful for AHH and its clients, but has been noticed by other communities that are looking to address their homeless citizens. The most significant of this interest came from Douglas County, which approached AHH a number of years ago, which led to a close, and expanding, partnership. AHH now has two respite houses in Lawrence and has established a close working relationship with public safety and other organizations in the community.

However, Kar Woo has also been approached recently by other communities. A county in Rhode Island and a non-profit in Arizona have been communicating with AHH about how they can use the strategies developed by AHH and apply them in their communities. AHH has also been discussing the AHH model with the City of Independence.

Joey Garrett's video presentation to last Sunday's meeting (less than 10 min). Joey met Woo when AHH was 2 men and 2 vans. He was one of the guys Woo dragged to the gym that eventually started dragging Woo to the gym. He told a reporter doing a story on the exercise element of AHH's program that "he guessed he'd traded one addiction for another, but this one is much healthier."

I used to remind Woo he cannot save the world. He'd answer, "Yes, but if I help one person, and they help one person, it'll be a better place." These guys demonstrate that he was right. As the BE THE CHANGE program marks its 15th year, thank you for helping make the world a better place.
